Funny Bunny

Experts find the world's largest rabbit species.



Researchers' latest discovery is way too big to fit in a magician's hat!

Scientists on the bunny trail recently uncovered fossils of the largest known rabbit species. The creature is named *Nuralagus* (nuh-RA-luh-guhss) *rex*. The bulky bunny tipped the scales at more than 26 pounds. That's about six times the size of today's cottontails.



Researchers found the fossils on Minorca. That island is part of Spain. The rabbit lived about 3 million to 5 million years ago.

The bunny may have roamed the island, but it probably didn't hop. While today's rabbits are light on their feet, *Nuralagus rex* had small hind legs and a short, stiff spine. Those features would have made jumping hard, expert Josep Quintana told *WR News*. He helped uncover the fossils.

What else set the bunny apart from its relatives? The creature's eyes and ears were small for its stature, or size. Why? *Nuralagus rex* didn't have any predators on

Minorca. The rabbit shared the island with dormice, bats, and tortoises.

The animal didn't need sharp hearing and sight to detect enemies, scientists say, so its ears and eyes got smaller over time.

Quintana plans to continue to study the fossils to learn more about the bunny. The find reminds him of another "wacky wabbit." He explains, "*Nuralagus rex* was similar to Bugs Bunny [because] he was so big and so different compared with other rabbits."
